Improved performance in local competitions – Y5/6 Tag Rugby Winners (5th in county), Gymnastics Winners, Y3/4 Tag Rugby Finalists, Futsal Finalists, as well as numerous top 5 finishes in a variety of sports including netball, hockey, orienteering, cross country, football and athletics.
