the kangaroo jumped

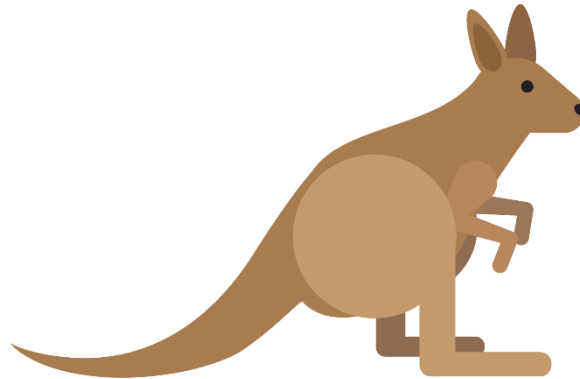
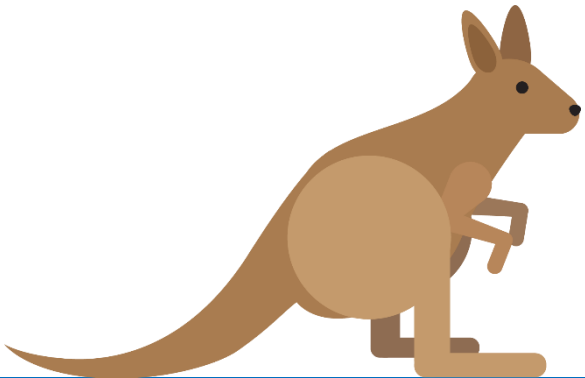


Let's learn

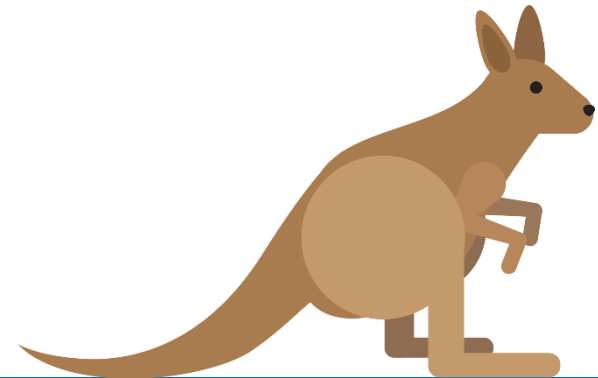
The **subject** is the **kangaroo** and the **verb** is **jumped**.

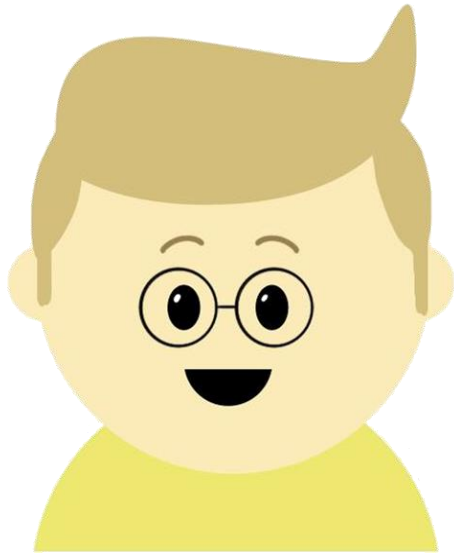
The **main clause** can be in different positions within a sentence but it will always make sense on its own.
