English: Poetry

Topic: Flow

Our new topic this term is called 'Flow'. Over the next seven weeks we will be learning about rivers – if possible, you can visit a local river or stream to find out what lives there, where the river is going and how fast it's travelling. At the river, you could collect water and soil samples and catch river creatures. Examine the samples to investigate how clean the water is.

We'll use our creativity to write journals as river travellers and journey on an imaginary boat to rivers around the world. Hopefully we'll make working models of water wheels, investigate the water cycle and use natural materials to make models that demonstrate river formation. We'll also learn about map reading and research skills will help us to find out about world famous rivers.

From humble beginnings, the river flows down the mountain and into the sea. Pull on your wellies and wade right in. How deep does it go and how fast does it travel? What soil types can you find by the river? Which animals make their homes there? Let's get down to the river bank and find out. Now hop on an imaginary boat and travel some of the world's most majestic rivers – the Ganges, the Thames, the Amazon and Nile – and keep a journal as you follow their course. Time to investigate. As part of the local news team, it's your task to track down the source of some mystery pollution. Where did it come from and who is to blame? Let's meander through the world of rivers, taking a dip into their watery world.

English – Grammar	Grammar – Prefixes <u>– What is a Prefix?</u> PREFIX The sound that comes before a root word is called a prefix, a prefix. When the prefix is added, it changes the meaning of the word. That's what a prefix does.

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	When a prefix is added to a root word, the root word stays the same and only the meaning is changed, for example, 'kind' takes on the opposite meaning when the prefix 'un-' (meaning "not") is added, creating the word 'unkind'.
	Work through the powerpoint and copy the work into your book (like we do in class). The powerpoint is in the Drop Box file.

English	English – The River – to be able to comment about the poem and highlight the verbs used to describe the river's movement
	Read Valerie Bloom's poem, <i>The River</i> , (see Drop Box File) and discuss the different individuals that the river is compared to and why they have been chosen.
	Listen to the rhythm of the poem – does it tell us anything about the speed of the river? What is the rhyme scheme used by the poet? What else have you noticed about the poem? What is your view of this poem? Do you like or dislike the poem and why? Learn a verse or verses to perform by heart.
	Identify careful vocabulary choices that have been made by the poet, and think about why they are effective.
	Highlight verbs used to describe the river's movement and think about the impression this gives the reader.

Science	River information – To be able to Make increasingly careful observations, identifying similarities, differences and changes and making simple connection.
	If possible, go outside and using natural materials (sand, rocks of different shapes and sizes, peat, earth, gravel, clay and stones) build a model that demonstrates river formation.
	Begin by making a mountain, then pour water down the mountain – small trickles at first, then heavier downpours. Observe what happens as the water runs down the surface, identifying what is carried downhill with the water, and how water travels around the larger, harder rocks and stones. Notice where smaller items, such as gravel and peat, are deposited and explain to an adult what happened using key technical vocabulary.
	Note: The <u>BBC</u> offers a selection of good examples. Children could record their activities with digital cameras and create a diagram showing how rivers are formed using their experience and a range of non-fiction books for reference. Complete the

	worksheet in the Drop Box File or draw your own version to show the journey of a River.

	The children should be able to identify how the prefix changes the meaning of the root word they add it to and be able to use words with these prefixes accurately in their writing.

	Thinking about the work you did yesterday, choose a particular river and create a list of appropriate verbs to provide information on how the water moves. Try and group verbs which link together, such as gurgling, humming and burbling, or dancing, tumbling and twisting.
	Have a go at creating sentences that compare the grouped verbs to individuals or things, such as 'The river's an acrobat, dancing, tumbling and twisting down the valley'.
	Rehearse these aloud to see how they sound and swap verbs around if appropriate.
	Try to think about a rhyming structure that you can use, such as ABAB or ABCB, as in the original poem – and show them how to write lines that rhyme.
