



Buy a Tile or two





Additional Details for the ACN York Pilgrimage of Hope 21-26 July 2025



Pilgrimage visits

The York Oratory have kindly invited us to use their church of St Wilfrid for Holy Mass and their meeting room for our talks and discussions. The sites we visit on this pilgrimage of hope are all strongly connected to the development of a powerfully enduring faith in Northern England, particularly during the Reformation. In each site we will reflect on those men and women who sacrificed themselves so that we may live in faith and hope. The pilgrim pack will include Morning and Evening Prayer, and a copy of the programme.

Spirituality

We will be accompanied by Fr Dominic Robinson SJ, our pilgrimage Spiritual Director. We will celebrate Holy Mass at the York Oratory and Evening Prayers daily at Bar Convent; we will have the opportunity for confessions, to pray the rosary together and pray the Angelus as near to noon as possible each day.

Meeting time and venue

Details will be given upon confirmation of pilgrimage booking and payment of a £90 deposit. Pilgrimage cost payable to ACN £285 which covers ACN organisational costs, coach from York to our daily excursion destinations, entry for York Cathedral and our visits to Ripon, Beverley and Fountains Abbey, Church donation costs, one pilgrim dinner and your pilgrim pack. Please remember that this 'pilgrimage cost' does not include your initial travel from home to and from York, accommodation, meals, and drinks, other than the one pilgrim dinner. If you are members of English Heritage please bring your IDs with you for use.

Travel to York

Please book, pay for, and make your own way to York; parking is limited in York. Please aim to arrive and be checked in by 5.30pm.

Accommodation

Please book and pay for your own accommodation ideally at the Premier Inn (York City Blossom St South), 28-40 Blossom Street, York YO24 1AJ. Prices per night start from £151 (including breakfast). If you wish to book accommodation elsewhere, please ensure you are at the coach pick up point each day at the time stated. The coach will not be able to do pick-ups & drop-offs to other accommodation.

Coach pick-up

The pick-up and drop-off point will be Memorial Gardens, Leeman Road, York YO26 4ZF (a short walk from the Premier Inn York City Blossom St South).

Food and drink

We are not including costs for food and drink (other than one dinner as stated above). Please allow for this in your budgeting. This will also ensure you can manage any dietary requirements. Please let us know of any dietary requirements at the point of booking your place.

Insurance, Medicines, and Mobility and Accessibility

Please take out your own insurance for belongings and personal travel. ACN is not liable for loss of belongings. If you take medication, please ensure you have all you need with you and you have adequate health insurance if it is necessary for your condition. The pilgrimage will include some walking and climbing stairs/uneven surfaces. Please be mindful of your mobility needs when deciding whether to join this pilgrimage. Some of the places we will visit will not be disability friendly in terms of physical mobility. Apologies in advance for this.







Pope Leo XIV's coat of arms blends Marian and Augustinian elements



The Holy See Press Office released the official explanation of Pope Leo XIV's coat of arms on Wednesday. In the explanation, Fr. Antonio Pompili, Vice President of the Italian Heraldic-Genealogical Institute, highlights its Marian and Augustinian elements.

The Pope's coat of arms includes the traditional papal symbols of the crossed keys of St. Peter ard episcopal mitre. The upper left-hand corner of the shield bears a silver fleur-de-lis set against a light blue background. On the bottom right, a red heart topped by a flame and pierced by an arrow sit atop a red book framed by an ivory background.

Pope Leo XIV's motto—IN ILLO UNO UNUM ("In the One, we are one")—sits at the bottom of the coat of arms. The motto echoes St. Augustine's sermon on Psalm 127, where he explains that "although we Christians are many, in the one Christ we are one."

Fr. Pompili pointed out that the blue field evokes "the heights of the heavens and is distinguishe 1 by its Marian significance, with the lily appearing as the classic symbol of the Blessed Virgin Mary." The opposite field, he noted, contains the heart enflamed and pierced by an arrow, which is the emblem of the Order of St. Augustine, of which Pope Leo XIV served as Prior General for two terms.

"This figure symbolically evokes Saint Augustine's words in the Confessions: 'Sagittaveras tu cor meum charitate tua' ("You pierced my heart with your love")," explained Fr. Pompili.

From the 16th century on, the symbol has appeared in the Augustinian coat of arms.

It is typically accompanied by the open book, which symbolizes "the Word of God that transform's every human heart, as it did Augustine's." "The book also recalls the enlightened works that the Doctor of Grace bestowed upon the Church and humanity," noted Fr. Pompili. "White (in the par al arms rendered in ivory) recurs in many religious orders' heraldry as a sign of holiness and purity."
